Grading and Transcripts

You will receive full college credit for these courses, and receive a separate college transcript (either from Antioch, CSUDH or Southern New Hampshire University) for completing this college course.

The grades you receive in these courses matters greatly! These are college grades, and whatever grade you earn in these courses you must report in college applications, transfer college applications and even applications to Master's degree programs after you complete college. These grades stick with you longer than your high school grades.

Time Commitment

These are full college courses, and you should expect to commit time to a college course similar to an honors level DVC course. This is a much greater commitment than a normal seminar, and you should expect to be doing significant homework outside of school for these courses.

Why Take These Courses?

These courses are all official college courses. They count as college credit, and will help you enter college already ahead in your path toward a bachelor's or associate's degree. Taking college courses in high school also makes your college application more competitive through showing that you have taken a rigorous set of courses and increasing your GPA.
